Auburn Website: A tour of the Auburn Website was provided to the attendees by Russ, explaining the areas of the website for visitors, community and businesses to access for information and advertising. SA Country Women's Association: SACWA

- Held their State Council meeting in Auburn in March with 100 attendees, bringing income to our community for accommodation, eateries, shopping, etc.
- Offering breakfast meal deals on public holiday weekends has brought many patrons into our shop.

Auburn Bowling Club:

- A successful year with Division 3 playing in the Grand Finals. Auburn hosted the Grand Final for Division 1 and 2. Thanks to all who assisted.

 Recreational Park Hall utilised for birthdays and Club gatherings


- 14 powered sites and 30 unpowered

- Committee progressing towards Incorporation


<u>Auburn Business and Tourism</u> Association: *ABTA*



Auburn's History Column:

With the sale of the RSL Clubrooms in Auburn, a great deal of memorabilia has been available to look through and clarifies why certain practices are carried out. One of these traditions is the playing of the bugle for a very solemn part of the Anzac Day service and other memorial services. The following story was in one of the RSL files.

American Civil War, when Union Army Captain Robert Ellicombe was with his men near Harrison's landing in Viginia. The Confederate Army was on the other side of the narrow strip of land.

During the night, Captain Ellicombe heard the moans of a soldier who lay severely wounded on the field. Not knowing if it was a Union or Confederate soldier, the Captain decided to risk his life and bring the stricken man back for medical attention. Crawling on his stomach through the gunfire, the Captain reached the stricken soldier and began pulling him toward his encampment.

When the Captain finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was actually a Confederate soldier, but the soldier was dead.

The Captain lit a lantern and suddenly caught his breathe and went numb with shock. In the dim light, he saw the face of the soldier. It was his own son. The boy had been studying music in the South when the war broke out. Without telling his father, the boy enlisted in the Confederate Army.

The following morning, heartbroken, the father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial, despite his enemy status. His request was only partially granted.

The Captain had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for his son at the funeral. The request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate. But, out of respect for the father, they did say they could give him only one musician.

The Captain chose a bugler. He asked the bugler to play a series of musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform.

This wish was granted. The haunting melody, we now know as 'The Last Post' used at military funerals was born.

God is nigh



A celebration for Australia's "laureate of the larrikin" C J Dennis in his birthplace in 1876 – 29 March 1953 a fountain was unveiled in Auburn. The stage-play and silent film that followed were also enormously popular.



Auburn CFS -

Membership recruitment drive

The Auburn CFS Brigade membership has declined to a lower than desired level over the past 10 years, when 14 new recruits became members in 2014. The Brigade is about to commence a new recruitment drive. There are numerous roles in the CFS in addition to Fire Fighters.

To become a CFS member, applicants are required to:

- Pass a confidential National Police History Check (NPHC) conducted by the SA Fire and Emergency Services Commission (SAFECOM). The required form is available from the Auburn CFS station;
- Then apply to become a member of the Auburn Brigade when the NPHC is successfully completed;
- Become familiar with the equipment on and operation of the Auburn 34 Fire Truck and the Auburn Quick Response Vehicle (QRV); and,
- Complete a weekend of basic training called BF1 (Brigade Fire Fighter 1).
 BF1 Courses are being conducted over the next 6 months.



We are looking for new recruits, men and women over the age of 18 years who are prepared to:

- make themselves available to help make Auburn a safer place;
- attend Brigade training and meetings on Tuesday nights;
- learn some new skills;
- meet some new people; and,
- be part of a team.
