## ACDC - August, Report

A good number of community members attended the Open Meeting on Wednesday night, providing discussion and asking questions on the reports presented.

U2KID's subcommittee Chairman. Ziersch informative presented very а summary on the Auburn Recreation Bike Park Project, which is part of a much larger project. A grant application is being prepared by Judy Giles (Community Development Coordinator for C&GVC) for substantial Federal funds to provide opportunities across the Council area. ACDC, U U2KID's, Auburn Recreational Park and other community groups are providing the support material. U2KID's has been asked to provide a small financial contribution of approximately \$2500.

These funds have been earned from *10c* refund on bottles and cans at the Auburn Caravan Park.

U2KID's, our community youth group, is seeking support for the construction of a multipurpose bike track facility within the Auburn Recreation Park grounds. The location has been agreed upon with Auburn Recreation Park and Council.

The proposed project aims to:

 address the need for accessible outdoor recreational spaces while promoting physical activity

- and fostering a sense of community youth engagement.
- provide a safe visible play area for young people and their families, local or visitors.
- become a tourist attraction for visitors to our caravan park and the town.
- meet the Clare & Gilbert Valley's Strategic Open Spaces - report outcome to enhance public spaces for more diverse and accessible play spaces for our youth across all council communities.

In July 2023, U2KID's undertook an online survey to determine the need and possible direction of the committee's focus for the bike park project.

U2KID's received 28 surveys, with the results of this survey being the key driver of our efforts.

The bike track will be designed to:

- accommodate riders of all ages and skill levels.
- enhance Community Health and Recreation.
- provide a safe and enjoyable environment.
- challenge older youths while also providing for early

- development of very young children.
- accommodate mountain bikes, BMX bikes, scooters, and balance bikes, promoting diversity and inclusion.
- provide a safe space for bikes and scooters, separate from the roadway.
- provide clear and open vision for parental supervision.
- meet concepts of longevity, sustainability and cost effectiveness as high priority factors.
- feature a surface of smooth bitumen featuring rolling mounds, curved sweeping berms, long flat sections.
- provide a platform for educational programs and events focused on bike safety, maintenance, and environmental stewardship.
- provide families and groups with a space for gatherings, celebrations, a meeting place.
- meet our community's priorities for promoting health and recreation opportunities in public spaces.
- provide Auburn with a valuable community asset.

Additional stages of this project will include a shelter, solar lighting, picnic table, bike racks and scooter stands, a drink fountain, attractive landscaping of small shrubs to beautify the area and encourage habitat for birds and creatures.

With the support of this grant, we can turn this vision into a reality, creating a lasting impact on the health and vitality of our community. The grant requirements include sustainability, environmentally sound, supporting the natural environment. We are committed to working collaboratively with local stakeholders to ensure its success.

U2KID's has a strong membership of youth who have embarked on this journey together to achieve their common goals, share their pride and, with the help of many passionate adults, recognise that their voices are important, and their decisions can become a reality. These kids will be the future of our town. Projects such as this bike park celebrates their vibrance, nurtures their self-determination and confidence to make positive contributions to their community.

<u>Memorial Place:</u> There has been movement on the site. A digger came and went, leaving a deep excavation ready for the concrete footings for the Gates. See separate item Page 12.

The Little Street Library: Will be available for you to deposit, withdraw and swap books as you choose. Encourage your children to participate in the exchange. Also, a range of books is encouraged, perhaps a few magazines.

ACDC Strategic Plan: Russ Parkins gave a presentation on the Strategic Plan that ACDC committee members have been working on over the last few months. This document will be shared with ACDC members, seeking their input into the Goals and Objectives that have been developed. We hope to receive some feedback, to assist with forward planning ACDC activities.

<u>Auburn Community Resilience:</u> A brief review of past Resilience related activity in our community was shared:

- A C&GVC coordinated Resilience program of meetings with Australia Red Cross facilitators 2020-21.
- Auburn community resilience planning meetings 2021-22
- Relevant Resilience information posters included in the Auburn Express, 2022
- A 'community safety corner' included in the Auburn Express, 2022

- Pillow-case program shared with the Auburn Primary School, 2022
- Sand for sandbagging in stock at local CFS, 2023

Guest speaker **David Cant**, a retired emergency services manager recently moving to this area. He gave an interesting power point presentation on community preparedness and resilience.

#### Some statistics:

- almost 50 floods in C&GVC area and 6 deaths, in 200 years.
- Stockport recent flood- 46 houses inundated and 70 people needing emergency relief.
- Lobethal was two weeks before formal relief and recovery was available after the Cuddlee Creek fire.
- Lobethal led its own recovery.

These questions were posed to the meeting audience, for consideration and discussions:

### What may happen in an emergency?

What do I do, who can help me?

I can't get home, I have no power, kids home alone.

I've lost my home, stock on the road, what can I do?

## What does it take to make your community more resilient?

- Assess the things that could adversely affect Auburn
- Connect and develop community understanding of these impacts
- Have a plan of Action

## What does it take to make your community more resilient?

- You need a local champion(s) to drive this
- It will die easily without local interest or support
- Learn what works and doesn't from likeminded groups

What is happening elsewhere locally?

#### **Watervale Resilience Group**

- → Seek and Connect Festival
- ◆A number of community development events
- → A resilient community hub
- →Community relief

David did recommend that we consider collaborating with other interested local communities, to work through options for moving forward on developing our resilience strategies. There would be some commonality in such plans across communities, and sharing ideas could assist with volunteer fatigue.

#### Where to.....from here?

Revisit already identified support strategies which are practical and relatively easy to apply.

Hold a Resilience Forum.

Calling for interested community members to meet and progress ideas.



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



## **Auburn's History Column:**

ACTIVE CWA MEMBERSHIP – Mrs Elaine Lambert

In **August 1980**, the following historic account of one of the Auburn branch members' activities was documented. A lot of community service followed this account, one being as a Councillor for the District Council of Saddleworth and Auburn.

Mrs Elaine Lambert of Undalya was congratulated in the print media as she had been elected as the new State President of the Country Women's Association of South Australia.

The announcement of her being chosen as State President by the eight and a half thousand members was made on Monday night 25<sup>th</sup> August, 1980 in the Union Hall of the

University of Adelaide, to a crowd consisting of distinguished guests, visitors and members of the C.W.A.

Elaine Claire Lambert (nee Taylor), first attended C.W.A. meetings in Auburn in 1952 and served that branch as a committee member, then President, from 1968-1975. She was elected to position of Warnes Group President in 1975 and then to the office of Lower Northern Divisional President, retiring on the completion of her three-year term. In this capacity she had been attending meetings of Property, Housekeeping and Emergency Aid Committees.

In her own right, Elaine was a member of the Finance Committee and Study and Investigation Committee where she was responsible for the portfolio on social issues. She had attended State Leadership School and was a member of the delegation to C.W.A. of Australia Conference 1979 and a Life Member of A.C.W.W. (Associated Country Women of the World, conferences she had attended).

After the ballot, the local branch sent Elaine the following message: - "A few words of congratulations from your home branch, we all knew you could do it Elaine and feel very honoured that you are a member of our branch.

Good luck and happy associations during your term of office as State President."

Elaine had been associated with people with disabilities for twenty-eight years. During this time, she had travelled State wide, helping to get the message across on the needs, and help for the organisations that assist these people. Elaine and her husband George's daughter Julie had *Cerebral Palsy* and was then holding down a government job, being completely independent of her parents.

At home (after the tragic death of son David) Elaine helped George with their Guernsey Stud dairy herd, milking morning and night, and preparing them for shows; most important of which was the Royal Adelaide Show. A project started by David, a Simmental Beef herd, was continued by George and Elaine.

(Simmental – Swiss Fleckvieh is a Swiss breed of dual-purpose cattle. It is named after Simmental – the valley of the Simme river – in Bernese Oberland, in the canton of Bern in Switzerland. The breed is typically reddish in colour with white markings, and is raised for both milk and meat – Wikipedia)



For the State President it was work as usual, helping husband George with the dairy herd. This photo was when the Lamberts were busy preparing for the Royal Adelaide Show. The cow "Kercoonda Vicki" did not attend the show that year, she had to stay home and care for two calves! Photo K. Lambert

Besides being a very busy farmer's wife, Elaine also attended functions necessary as the wife of the chairman of the District Council of Saddleworth and Auburn. Undoubtedly, George was proud of his wife's appointment and assisted her when possible. On being asked "can you cook", as Elaine would be

away a great deal, he replied, dodging the issue "How about a hand with the cows?"

For recreation George and Elaine stayed at their Lake Bonney shack, where he as driver of their ski boat, and friends, would be water skiing for hours, while Elaine provided the meals for "whoever was about" and endeavoured to really relax.

This busy person still made time for an activity she liked, her weekly Yoga group at Saddleworth. She also was the President of the Uniting church Ladies Guild at Auburn, an Elder in the Church and took a turn as the Church organist.

## Auburn Street planter tub damage what is going on?

**History:** The 25 planter tubs on the footpaths in Main North Road and St Vincent Street were installing in August 2016 – 8 years ago, by a group of community volunteers and funded by **Business** Auburn and **Tourism** Association (ABTA), then known as Auburn Traders Association. They were replacements for a number of old half wine barrels. During 2017, they were further enhanced with a mosaic art project, coordinated by the ABTA and contributed to by Auburn Primary School students and manv adult community volunteers. The planter tubs and mosaics are quite unique to Auburn.

Over the past 8 years, the planters have been maintained by community volunteers: conducting the summer watering, pruning, fertilising, cleaning and painting. Also, over that time there has been 1 or 2 small accidents and incidents that have required repairs to the planters.

Damage: In the past 6 months, however, there has been a number of serious incidents causing substantial damage to the planters and the mosaics, as well the theft of at least one stainless steel sign. At the Road House, we assume a vehicle has run into this one. How could that happen?



At the World War 1 Memorial, someone has possably kicked a hole in the glass mosaic and planter. The Planter at Colours of Auburn has also suffered slight damage – a boot?






The stainless steel sign from the Ford Street intersection planter has been stolen.

## **Memorial Place - Update**



The Memorial Place Project has been at a standstill since before April. This has been due to the work and approvals required for the relocation of the WW2 Memorial Gates and their new footings.

## What's new?

- a. The Memorial Place subcommittee was successful in obtaining a Clare & Gilbert Valleys Council Community Asset Grant to the value of \$2,995 for soil material to fill the planter tubs, plants and lighting. We are very appreciative of Council's support.
- b. The restoration of the WW2 Memorial Gates has been completed, Council approval for the footings and engineering has been obtained and the holes for the footings have been dug.



#### What's next?

As soon as the WW2 Gates are in position, work to finish the surface of Memorial Place will be completed. This will then allow the seating and planter tubs to act as a balustrade to be put into position. Then the planter tubs can be filled, planted and the lighting installed. The Memorial Place subcommittee will be very happy to see that day come.

#### What then?

Consideration will then be given to the possibility of paving the Memorial Place site and the possible installation of some shade. A permanent record of donors will also be part of these considerations. We would be hoping to secure some grant funding for this additional work. These matters have been discussed but no decision on these matters have been made at this stage.

More recruits are still needed. Time is running out to get the recruits trained for the approaching Fire Danger Season.




We are looking for men and women over the age of 18 years who are prepared to:
