So, it's still warm and dry. Perhaps it's time for a rain dance. Grab a coffee and catch up on local news and happenings.


Auburn Community Consultation on underground powerlines: Without trying to sound too dramatic, a potential History Making community consultation session is being arranged at the Auburn Institute, Supper Room on Thursday 20th March to discuss moving forward with the potential **NEW LOOK** for Auburn... This important opportunity is being organised and supervised by Council. Not only will Council staff be in attendance but representatives from the Auburn Community Development Committee. Rhonda, Joan, David, Hellen, Graham and Rob.

It has been designed as a "drop in" session, where you will have the opportunity to view pictures/images/graphics of Auburn Main Street with and without POWERLINES. It is your opportunity to register your support "to see or not to see" powerlines in Auburn's Main Street. This will take 5-10 minutes of your time.

We strongly advise your involvement – please come along and register your comments and views to support this community session which will support Council's submissions with their funding partners.

The 'Auburn Streetscape Plan' you might remember was developed in 2021-22 and

remains on the table for Council, however, an important feature of this plan is the **undergrounding of the powerlines** in the main business area and must be determined prior to any further advancement of the overall plan.



Open Meeting: The next ACDC meeting will be an Open Meeting to be held on Wednesday 9th April 2025 at the Auburn Institute at 7pm. All community members are welcome to attend. Community Groups will be invited to attend to present short reports on their recent projects and developments. There will also be a discussion session on ACDC's Strategic Plan, seeking community input into goals and priorities for our future planning.

Supper will be provided, so hope you will come along and join us.

Council Community Asset Grant (CAG):

ACDC was successful with its submission to Council's second round of *CAG* offers. We have been successful and granted \$5,000 towards the purchase and installation of a

Digital Notice Board. Progress of this project will be reported next month.

Community Breakfast: ACDC invites our community to attend the Community Breakfast on Sunday 4th May, 2025 in Centenary Park from 8.30am. This will be a free event, with delicious bacon, egg, muffins etc., available. A glass of Bubbles will be available with each breakfast. Drinks for the kids, and fruit available. This event will also host the ACDC's Community Awards for 2025. A reminder that Nominations close on March 31st.

Council Budget Bids: Council invited Peak Bodies to participate in a new Council Budget Bid system preparing for their 2025-26 budget, whereby we were asked to submit priorities for funding/project opportunities. ACDC representatives have spent considerable time completing submissions as possible projects for Auburn:

- Auburn Institute accessible toilets
- Restoration and Upgrade of the old Council Chambers building,
- Auburn underground powerlines,
- Auburn Cemetery Niche Wall (extension to existing infrastructure),
- Wakefield Riverwalk extension, Auburn Street greening (Church St).

ACDC looks forward to the release of Council's draft Budget.

Auburn Frenchfest: A small subcommittee of ACDC has been formed and some initial discussions relating to the next event have been held. The next Frenchfest event will be in 2026, possible dates have been discussed, however a final decision has not yet been made.

Auburn's History Column:

Continuing the account of the 1849-1857 Gulf Road re-enactment in the Jubilee 150 (J150) year of 1986

In 1986, South Australians excelled themselves with their generous giving of their time in volunteering in their communities and in the process, enjoyed the fellowship with locals and regional people alike.

The Gulf Road re-enactment committee comprised representatives from the District Council areas from Burra through to Port Wakefield. Each of the communities in this zone held individual festivities when the reenactment bullock team drivers with their two wheeled drays and supporters, travelled over the former track and reached the destination of Port Wakefield (known as Port Henry originally) a distance of over 96 kms.

J150 functions were all registered in the State and printed in the State program, with all printed material having the J50 logo.



Our Auburn functions had the Jubilee 150 – J150 logo

The re-enactment group arrived at the Auburn Recreation Ground on Wednesday 22nd October; this was reported in the December, 2024 issue of the Auburn Express, when the Bullocky Dinner beard competition was highlighted.



A dinner was prepared in the Auburn Recreation Park Kiosk by volunteers for the Uniting Church. Serving the main course in an assembly line are Kay Lambert, Elva Williams, Rachel Garrard, Coral Blatchford and Judy Scott. Shown receiving a meal is Betty Hall and others carrying their plate along to have the hot serve completed.

In those days all crockery and cutlery required in the town for functions would be hired from the Recreation Park and kept locked in a cupboard in the Kiosk. Elva Williams was in charge of this and orders for hiring were given through her.



The next day visitors to the town had a chance to get to know Auburn.

Bruno Stocco, National Trust vice chairman, was a former school teacher and licenced to operate the movie projector, assisted by National Trust Treasurer, Peter Shipside.

Meet at the BBQ pavilion in Centenary Park for sign-in.


The plantings on the river are still coping, but we will use the working bee to water and mulch. Bring a bucket and/or a garden fork.

SA Country Fire Service: A Legacy of Protection



Serving South Australians Since 1847

A Rich History of Community Firefighting

The South Australian Country Fire Service (CFS) has a proud history of protecting communities from wildfires and emergencies. What began as informal local efforts has grown into a statewide emergency response network, fueled by dedicated volunteers and government support.

The Early Years: 1847 - 1913

- 1847: First fire control law introduced to prevent reckless burn-offs
- 1913: Councils empowered to appoint Fire Control Officers
- Local firefighting remained informal, with residents banding together to tackle blazes

\chi Post-War Advancements: 1940s – 1976

- WWII introduced vital firefighting technology: radios, motor transport, knapsack sprays
- Emergency Fire Service (EFS) established for volunteer brigades
- After the war, government loaned firefighting equipment to local councils
- 1976: The Country Fires Act officially created the SA Country Fire Service (CFS)

🚣 Expanding Responsibilities

Over time, the CFS has grown beyond rural firefighting to include:

- Road crash rescue
- Hazardous materials response

- Structure fire training
- High-angle rescues

2005: The SA Fire and Emergency Services Act modernized the CFS, ensuring statewide rapid response capabilities.

🐎 CFS Today: Powered by Volunteers

The CFS remains volunteer-driven, with thousands of South Australians dedicating their time to protecting lives and property.
