Time to Celebrate!

At last, the closing of a chapter and the opening of another! The old **Wakefield Council Chambers Building** at 5-7 St. Vincent Street, Auburn, will become the property of the Auburn community on Monday 19th May 2025, with final documents having been signed, today, Friday 16th. It has been suggested that there be an 'Open Day' for the building...more details next month.

<u>Auburn Institute:</u> The subcommittee is excited to confirm the Auburn Institute is registered as a venue for SALA 2025, and already Artists have booked wall space for the upcoming event. Look for further information and advertising of this event in the next editions.

<u>U2KIDs:</u> The subcommittee organised and held a very successful Easter egg hunt, followed by a well-attended movie at the end of last school term. Thanks to parents and families for coming along and having ham and cheese toasties and popcorn. Thanks to the generous donors of empty bottles and cans, the U2KIDs' funds continue to grow, assisting with the costs of the events held throughout the year for Auburn youth.

The Memorial Place subcommittee: Having completed all work identified in the initial scope of works, committee is researching ways to display and acknowledge the names of donors for this very successful local project.

Auburn Frenchfest Update: A further 'callout' has been made for committee members for the Auburn Frenchfest subcommittee. Please see the poster in this edition (page 2), calling for interested people to attend a meeting on May 29th at Auburn Institute.

Community Breakfast: A lovely sunny morning on Sunday May 4th, saw community members gather in Centenary Park for ACDC's Community Breakfast. The favourite chipolatas, bacon, eggs and muffins were cooked and served by a wonderful crew of Auburn volunteers, alongside juice and a few bubbles. We were grateful for the talents and skills of our volunteers who were able to provide background music. This event also celebrated the commitment and generosity of our community volunteers, by presenting Paul McCormack with an ACDC Community Award for 2025. Congratulations Paul.

Auburn Strategic Plan: ACDC executive committee and past committee member Russ Parkins continue to work on the ACDC Strategic Plan. Attention will be given to the responses gathered at the April Open Meeting, and it is hoped that there can be more opportunities to involve community members in further developing this document. Goal 1, "to improve engagement with residents and widen the cross section of community members who participate in community activities" will be one topic of focus.

<u>Peak Body Forum:</u> This is an event organised by Council for all Peak Bodies (town Progress

Associations) to meet and share information about local developments/projects; a meeting will be held on June 2nd. The Peak Bodies were set up in 1998-99 as a mechanism for community representation with Council. A review of the Council/Peak Body process was held by Council during 2024, to gauge opinion on the workings of this process. There has been considerable changeover of Council Staff at executive level, in the last 12-18 months and with this comes different ideas and ethos.

Auburn Streetscape Consultation: ACDC awaits any update from Council on this matter. ACDC did make submissions to the Council Budget Bid process requesting funds be made available for underground powerlines along a section of Main North Road, and greening of Church Street.

Wakefield River Walk Brochures: An ACDC member has discovered an 'old' "Wakefield River Walk" brochure. It was agreed this brochure should still have a presence in Auburn. ACDC members will consult with the local Upper Wakefield Landcare (UWL) Group to discuss future possibilities for this brochure.

<u>Rainfall:</u> A local resident has requested ACDC's assistance in determining the current status of the Auburn PO, as an **official rain reporting point**. ACDC will make some enquiries.





Flu Vaccination Service Now Available at Clare Valley Family Pharmacy

Clare Valley Family Pharmacy is now offering the 2025 influenza vaccine to help protect the local community against this year's flu season. The vaccine available is the **2025 quadrivalent flu vaccine**, as recommended for use in Australia this year.

The influenza vaccine is recommended annually for everyone aged six months and over. Vaccination helps reduce the risk of serious illness, hospitalisation, and complications caused by the flu, especially in higher-risk groups.

Under the **National Immunisation Program (NIP)**, the flu vaccine is **free** for eligible individuals, including:

- People aged 65 years and over
- Pregnant women
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
- Individuals with certain chronic medical conditions

Please note: Flu vaccinations for children under five years of age are not available in pharmacy settings and should be arranged through a GP or immunisation clinic.

At Clare Valley Family Pharmacy, flu vaccines are available to those aged 18 years and over, with a private fee of \$25 for individuals who are not covered under the NIP.

The Auburn CFS is entirely staffed by volunteers—locals who juggle full-time jobs, family commitments, and everyday life while still making themselves available to respond at a moment's notice. Many of our CFS members work in businesses around Auburn and the broader Clare and Gilbert Valleys. When an emergency call comes in, they drop everything—whether they are in the middle of their workday, spending time with family, or even sleeping—to respond.

Local businesses play a crucial role in this system of support. Many employers in our area understand the importance of the CFS and allow their employees to leave work when an emergency arises. Without this generosity, our firefighting capacity would be significantly diminished. These businesses, from mechanics to retail shops, wineries to farms, are part of the fabric that holds our community together.

The Sacrifices of Service

Volunteering for the CFS is not just about the adrenaline of firefighting—it requires commitment, training, and a willingness to sacrifice personal time. Regular training sessions ensure that members are prepared for any emergency, developing skills in fire suppression, vehicle rescue, first aid, and communications.

These men and women also face the mental and emotional toll that comes with responding to disasters, witnessing traumatic events, and working under immense pressure. Despite this, they continue to serve because they know their efforts are making a difference.
