ACDC - June, Report

An Historical Moment: The old Wakefield Council Chambers building at 5-7 St. Vincent Street Auburn, became the property of the Auburn community on Monday 19th May 2025, with the handing over of the keys from Council's Mayor Allan Aughey to ACDC Chair Rhonda Seymour and executive committee representatives Hellen Riley and Joan Concy, also, local Auburn National Trust member Kay

Lambert.

ACDC is organising a "Drop-in Session" at the old Wakefield Council Chambers Building on

Thursday 26th June from 2.40pm to 4.30pm, opposite the Post Office, for "Comments and Suggestions" from community members. Please come along to the viewing.

Our Volunteers will be in attendance during this time. The building will be open for community members to visit and chat about the future of the building and the process



involved. Please come along. Tea and Coffee will be available.

<u>Council's Peak Body Forum:</u> Three of ACDC's committee attended this event held in Riverton. Five community Peak Bodies provided the meeting with a precis of their activities. Council personnel shared

information on Council Land Tenure types and Council Cemeteries. Recommendations from last year's Peak Body review were requested to be shared with the Peak Bodies, which will be useful to develop strategies for improved communications and positive experiences between Council and the community.

Auburn Footpath and street trees adjacent to North Street: Council has been working on replacement of a section of footpath in front of the Senior Citizens building. As this job progressed, the Telstra pits were found to need replacement. This has been happening this last week, along with removal of asbestos from these sites. Council contacted ACDC to indicate that due to a layer of limestone beneath the footpath, and subsequent discussions by elected members at Councils May meeting, Council is suggesting that street trees will not be replaced, and some low shrubbery would be planted. ACDC has written to Council requesting immediate consultation with our community on this matter.

Auburn's History Column:

<u>Jubilee 150 (J150) October 1986 at Auburn, continued</u>

The Auburn Progress Association had decided to hold a Honey Festival in conjunction with the J150 Gulf Road Re-enactment when its resting stage was to be at Auburn. Some volunteers worked incredibly hard to bring the successful procession about and when the Apiary industry was invited to participate, they did.





The South Australian Apiarists Association United banner was where then Chairman of the District Council of Saddleworth and Auburn, Murray l'Anson, officially opened the Honey Festival on Saturday 25th October, in front of what was often referred to as the Scout Hall (the early Mechanics Institute 1859) in St Vincent Street. At the left of the photo – Councillor Peter Shipside, Robert Wehrman President of the SA Apiarists' Association, Murray l'Anson with a top hat, then Kay Lambert and to the right is Anne l'anson with son Kim l'Anson.



The Gulf Road Re-enactment bullock teams and the supporting crew left the Auburn Recreation Ground that morning, heralded at the front of the Honey Festival procession by Stephanie Moore and Sarah Shipside with the Honey Festival banner and Joanna Lambert leading two little bees, Sally Sandow and James Russell.

Jim Kelly and the bullock teams were next, followed by Michael Lambert on his grandfather's bike with a beehive in between the handlebars and a smoker on the back, depicting how his grandfather commenced beekeeping.

Wirrabara beekeepers Dick and Alice Morgan driving a little red car converted into a buckboard with a beehive and honey extractor on the back, which showed how Trevor Deer's family commenced beekeeping.

A number of beekeeping trucks followed, Trevor Deer of Wirrabara had honey drums and beehive "supers" on his tray, Les and Marie Bryksy of Watervale had a lifting arm, honey extractor, beehive supers on pallets, Don Lambert's truck with Richard Lambert hanging like a bee in front, driver Graham Woolford of Clare, with Steven Button (Auburn) and Ray Bickle (Halbury) on back tending to beehives, the truck being decorated by eucalypt tree cuttings. (Richard, the "bee" was spayed by a water pistol by clown Philip Allen!)



Bike & bee keeping trucks

Ken Kingston of Saddleworth with a settler's barrow which was set up ready to pan for gold. Zackers of Balaklava had an old small truck beautifully restored (Chevrolet?)

A clown on a decorated small bike, (Noel Kelly of Clare), peddled around between the floats. Another clown on a small bike also entertained the crowd

Nick Zwiersen drove his truck with the title Beeswax Ensemble and musicians Chris Smith of Sevenhill James Parker, Leonie Moore, Dorothy, Bill and John Matz on the back.

The Primary School had a "float" called the Island Pool Monster, the leaders being Mary Anne Baker and Mark Burfield.





The "Good Old Days" – The driver and truck owner of this 'active Good Old Days' exhibit float was Lawrence Iskov, with those on the back being Josephine McDermid, Joan Kench, (hidden Janet McDermid) and Lois Dempsey "washing" Ted McDermid's hair, Ted appearing to be undressed! The mangle was used in the old days to press the sheets.

This was the winning float as judged by Murray l'Anson

Flu Vaccination Service Now Available at Clare Valley Family Pharmacy

Clare Valley Family Pharmacy is now offering the 2025 influenza vaccine to help protect the local community against this year's flu season. The vaccine available is the **2025 quadrivalent flu vaccine**, as recommended for use in Australia this year.

The influenza vaccine is recommended annually for everyone aged six months and over. Vaccination helps reduce the risk of serious illness, hospitalisation, and complications caused by the flu, especially in higher-risk groups.

Under the **National Immunisation Program (NIP)**, the flu vaccine is **free** for eligible individuals, including:

- People aged 65 years and over
- Pregnant women
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
- Individuals with certain chronic medical conditions

Please note: Flu vaccinations for children under five years of age are not available in pharmacy settings and should be arranged through a GP or immunisation clinic.

At Clare Valley Family Pharmacy, flu vaccines are available to those aged 18 years and over, with a private fee of \$25 for individuals who are not covered under the NIP.





Behind the Sirens: A Day in the Life of a Volunteer Firefighter

Living and Responding in the Mid North of South Australia

It's early morning in the Mid North. The skies are clear, but the dry grass crackles underfoot. A local farmer finishes his coffee when the pager shrieks to life. Within minutes, a group of volunteers—some in work boots, others just home from night shift—assemble at the station. The call: a grassfire threatening a property just out of town.

This is the life of a volunteer firefighter in our region—one shaped by scorching summers, strong winds, and flood-prone plains. Our volunteers juggle everyday lives with unpredictable emergencies. One moment they're stacking shelves, attending school dropoff, or working on the farm, and the next they're in a yellow jacket navigating rough terrain, smoke, or rising floodwater.

After a call-out, gear is cleaned, the truck is refuelled, and tired hands make sure everything is ready for the next emergency. Often, the crew shares a laugh or debrief over a cold drink or quick bite, knowing the job is only truly finished when everyone is home safe.

But it's not all fire and flood. Tuesday training nights bring the brigade together. New skills are learned, scenarios are run, and friendships are formed. For many, it's the best part of the week—a chance to connect, learn, and give back.

Being a volunteer firefighter here is about more than emergencies. It's about being part of something bigger than yourself. It's a commitment to your neighbours, your town, and your land. And there's always room for one more pair of hands.

Auburn CFS Newsletter #4, June 2025.

Clare & Gilbert Valleys Council (CGVC) CEO, David Stobbe - "Meet and Greet".

CGVC organised a "Meet and Greet" session at Velvet and Willow on Wednesday 4th June to provide community members to meet the new CEO David Stobbe.

Approx. 20 people attended. Participants introduced themselves to the CEO and were able to speak, raise concerns, ask questions and make comments about their particular area of interest.

Topics covered included:

- Corellas in Auburn. This problem needs to be addressed. One resident sold their homes and left Auburn because of the issue. ACDC and local residents have contacted CGVC re this matter for at least 4 years, without any resolution.
- Development Applications: these need to be lodged through SA Planning now and not through CGVC. More support locally is needed to assist residents with DA applications.
- Roads and bitumen, who decides what roads are asphalted? Henry Steet was recently re-sheeted when streets in East Auburn remain gravel roads.
- The importance of tourism in our area: an audit of "roadside signage" needs to be undertaken as a lot of tourist signage is out of date. Some 'attractions' no longer exist, or new ones are not signposted.
- Detour of Heavy traffic coming from Brothers Hill Road into Auburn is needed. The obvious route is to use Flaxmill Road and Taylors Road. This was raised by three different people.
- Wakefield River walk extension: several community members have spoken with Council re this. It would be a good project to undertake at little cost and good to extend the existing River Walk, creating a loop with the Riesling Trail. CGVC does not control the riverbed and banks.
- Feral tree removal in the Wakefield River bed and banks has taken away residents' 'privacy screening' at some properties. Concern expressed of well rooted and established trees being removed.
- Response to Works requests to CGVC currently was praised. Working well through the current Council system.
- Communication from CGVC back to community can improve. Communications from community members to council are not being acknowledged or responded to, or the response time is very long.
- The current footpath repaving/tree removal project on the northern end of Main North Road had poor community notification. There was only a few days' notice given that the project was being undertaken. Discussions by elected members at CGVC May meeting lead to a suggestion that street trees will not be replaced and some low shrubbery would be planted. Serious community consultation is needed on this subject so that the current project does not set a precedence for future street tree removal.
- Undergrounding of power lines consultation as part of Auburn Streetscape plan- a
 request was made for the collation of community comments to be shared with ACDC,
 so this can be shared with those who participated in the consultation, to acknowledge
 their efforts.
- More lead time was requested for advertising Council-initiated community events, such as the Auburn streetscape consultation and this CEO meet and greet.

- The regular use of Council website was emphasised as one of Council's main avenues for advertising current Council matters and events. Make sure you check CGVC website front page regularly for community consultations.
- Community members expressed the joy they received from living in Auburn.
- There is a difficulty recruiting new members to volunteer groups.
- Availability and access to Medical Rehabilitation facilities in our immediate area was raised--car accident victims and the aged. Options are all too far away.
- Auburn RSL building sale and disbursement of the funds policy was raised. It is now 18 months since the building sale settled and there has been no communication with Auburn community about these funds.
