Auburn's History Column:

Jubilee 150 (J150) October 1986 at Auburn, Procession of floats, continued

The Auburn RSL float utility was driven and owned by George Schulz with Vic Gaerth on the back. This float proudly had a large RSL monogram badge on the front of the vehicle and large Australian flag displayed on the back.

The CWA truck was George Lambert's with George driving and on the back were Sonia Zwiersen, Helen Smith and John Masterman, wearing a top hat. CWA activities were exhibited on the truck. Driver Roger Schmerl supported the Children's Hospital Auxiliary volunteers, Anne Masterman, Barbara Lamkin holding a parasol, the nursing Sister walking was Helen Williams, with Gill Baum wearing her red cape, on the utility.



There was a group of former Land Army girls from the second world War Days, marching and carrying their large green and gold banner with one of the ladies wearing her uniform. The Land Army women came from a wide area and helped with the flax production in the Auburn area during World War II, and living in a hostel at Undalya.

Dad's Army was led by Zella Schulz in uniform, causing a laugh; some of the other ladies were – Sadie Shepherd, Dossy Schober, and Mary Ackland, keeping time with the beating of a Base Drum.

The Auburn Bowling club float was on Leon Klau's truck which he was driving, with John Williams having extra padding and Arthur Kench padded up as a woman in a lady's bowling dress demonstrating bowling on the "green" on the back of the truck.



Taylor's Winery float was a rubber tyred small trailer with Leith Jenkins and his two donkeys in control, David Slow also sitting in the front with Maureen Gaerth in colonial costume and grandson Grant Allen on the back of the float with a wine barrel.

The District Council of Saddleworth and Auburn had a patrol grader and low loader machinery trailer loaded with a tip dray with its wooden wheels, its load of large stones tipped of its load of stone onto the trailer - the driver was Max Allen with Reg Geister and Colin Fiedler on the back "at work"!



The model of the Undalya bridge was towed by Gerald Moore by tractor, Samara Butler was on the bridge -the painting of the scenery on the sides of the bridge were the artwork of Mrs Masterman, some of which is in the CWA room on the wall today. This photographic scene is in St. Vincent Street.

The model of the bridge was first used for a procession for the "New Oval" opening in 1960, when in the street procession to the oval it was pulled by a grey Fergy tractor driven by Keith Sandercock and David Lambert was riding a three-wheeler bike on the 'bridge'.

The Mule team with a loaded wagon was led by Jim Lowe, Jim also had some camels.

The Tennis Club and Netball Club both had a contribution to the procession as did a group in their white uniforms doing *Taekwondo*.

The Circle C Western Riding Club had a number of horses with their banner plus a J150 flag

Peter Shipside's car was part of the parade, a 1939 MG WA Tickford Coupe

The bullockies and their teams went on through St. Vincent Street and onto the Skilly where, with a view to the sea coast from Hoiles Hill, a cairn was unveiled with a plaque of the story of the gulf road Wine Shany, the Port Henry Arms, near the site. The remainder of the procession finished in St. Vincent Street, the people milling amongst street stalls with their festive bunting.

AUBURN BRIGADE

As the summer heat fades and winter rolls across the Mid North, the nature of our work at Auburn CFS changes too. Fires become fewer, but the hazards don't disappear—they just take a different shape.

Misty mornings and cold rain transform country roads into danger zones. The bitumen gets slick with the first rain after a dry spell, and roads that curve through farmland become treacherous if taken too fast. Our volunteers are often called to the scene of car accidents—sometimes it's a minor slide-off, but other times it's much more serious. The worst part is knowing it might have been avoided with better tyres, working lights, or just slowing down a little.

When that pager goes off, there's a hush as we prepare for what might lie ahead. Accidents, especially on familiar backroads, hit close to home. Sometimes it's a neighbour, a friend's teenage child, or a visitor passing through who didn't realise just how sharp that bend really was.

Winter also brings strong winds and heavy rain. Large gum branches fall overnight, blocking roads and driveways, or damaging power lines. We've had early morning call-outs to clear fallen limbs before the school buses run, making sure families can get to town safely.

And then there's flooding. Low-lying areas around Auburn can fill quickly when the water has nowhere to go. We've helped divert run-off from homes and cleared storm drains during wild weather. Sandbagging isn't glamorous, but it can mean the difference between a dry lounge room and a damaged home. These colder months bring their own rhythm—a quieter kind of urgency. The work doesn't stop; it just shifts with the seasons. And through it all, our small brigade remains ready, willing, and proud to serve our town whenever we're needed.

Drive safe this winter. Maintain your vehicle, take it slow—and know we're here when it matters most.

Auburn Green – Caring for Country Winter 2025 Edition – Attracting Butterflies to Your Garden

Even in the cooler months, your garden can be a haven for butterflies. While many species slowdown in winter, become dormant, you'd be surprised how a few small changes can invite life into your patch of paradise.

Common Butterflies in Our Region

In the Clare Valley, local butterflies such as the *Red-spotted Jezebel*, *Common Brown*, *Wanderer (Monarch)*, and *Australian Painted Lady* may still be spotted on sunny winter days. And of course, keep an eye out for the beautifully elusive *Emerald Jewel* (Red Emerald), a rare treat when seen fluttering through native shrubs.

Winter Gardening Tips

Butterflies are drawn to sunny, sheltered spots with food plants for their caterpillars and nectar for the adults. Here's how you can help:

Plant Native Species: Local natives are best suited to our climate and butterfly species. Try planting:

- Woolly Tea-tree (Leptospermum lanigerum) great for shelter and nectar
- Goodenia ovata bright flowers even in winter
- Correa reflexa (Native Fuchsia) blooms that feed both butterflies and birds
- Hardenbergia violacea (Native Lilac) a climber with stunning purple flowers

Provide Winter Blooms: Flowering annuals like calendula or pansies can supplement native plants with extra colour and nectar.

Offer Water: Shallow dishes with pebbles give butterflies a place to safely drink.

Avoid Pesticides: Chemicals can harm butterflies and their caterpillars. Let nature manage your pests.

Let Your Garden Speak for the Climate

Even small patches of green can offer sanctuary to wildlife. By planting for pollinators, you're helping restore natural cycles and support biodiversity right here in Auburn.
