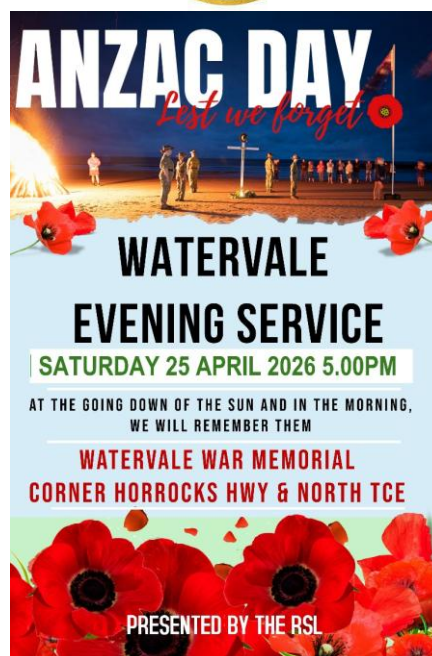
subsequent micro-systems. Both Pat and Ashley are hopeful to connect with interested community members to advance their projects. We hope that Pat and Ashley will report again in the future.

Auburn's History Column:

When Don Lambert was a boy "Binks" Williams lived next door to him in No 3 Henry Street, a rental house owned by H.H. Overton.

"Binks" was the manager of Elder, Smith & Co. Limited. "Binks" had formerly been at Saddleworth for SA Farmers Union when this company sold to Elders Smith. After 10 years he had the opportunity to become Manager of Elder's sub-branch at Auburn in 1933, a one room office. "Binks" wrote an interesting account of his career with Elders and this file has been donated to the Auburn branch of the National Trust.

Some of his experiences are noted here, particularly in times of fuel shortage when he was stationed at Mount Pleasant – we are concerned today regarding the Australian fuel situation. (*The Auburn friendship continued with "Binks" family, two sisters of Don's were invited to Mount Pleasant to stay.*)

A large off shears sale was a highlight of his time at Auburn. Mr Joe Kenworthy had bought the property St Andrews from Mr David Lyall. J.K. owned Mt Vivian Station in the North West and Oulnina in the North East. A thousand of J. K's young wethers were trucked (rail) from Mannahill to Manoora station. (*Drovers moved walking stock to and from sale yards*). This same sale G.W. Williams of Greenwood Park provided a nice draft, and together when all the locals rallied, 5,000 sheep filled the yards and sheep yard races.

In his memoirs "Binks" recorded the wartime when petrol was severely rationed and to get around the work, they had to revert to gas

producers fitted on the back of the car. The fuel for this “abomination” was charcoal, which was kept in bags in the boot. Elder’s staff had to light the burner and get it hot before it would work, so they had to start on petrol, wind down a blind which was fitted in front of the radiator, get the temperature of the engine up to 200° and switch over to gas, then hope for the best.

He did 5,000 miles on gas. Very high temperature when working and it was quite close to the petrol tank.

Before petrol supplies became normal, he was given the tip, with careful planning, the car would run on dieseline with the same gadgets as were used with gas. Dieseline was available when petrol wasn’t. This was illegal so was kept tightly locked with a fuel pipe under the body up to the engine. He covered a lot of work this way, but was caught by Elder’s Garage manager who told him he didn’t think he would do such a thing to the lovely Chev. Car.

“Binks” reported that he had to be careful though, as the car would exhaust volumes of blue smoke and the police would “grab you”. But considering all the experiences, he got through the terrible war years.

During the latter part of petrol rationing a friend of “Binks” asked if he would like to buy some

petrol. He asked “is it hot” and was told 100%. He was supplied 400 gallons but couldn’t pay for that much at once. He was only supplied a receipt to keep him out of gaol!

The fuel was put in the old stable in the backyard and covered with hay bales. The cost was £100. £25 was paid every month and a receipt was put in the cash box. Sometime later Elder’s auditor found the receipts in the cash box and queried them. “Binks” told him the story without divulging the supplier’s name but the auditor wasn’t satisfied. “Binks” told him where the official receipt was in another place and explained the conditions that he got the fuel and walked out of the office. The auditor said a few minutes later he would not sight the receipts but if ever “Binks” repeated this incident he would be sacked – but the auditor had a smile on his face!

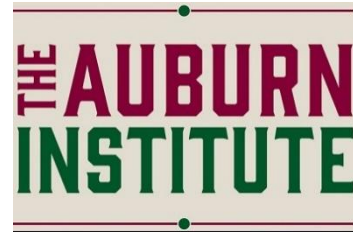

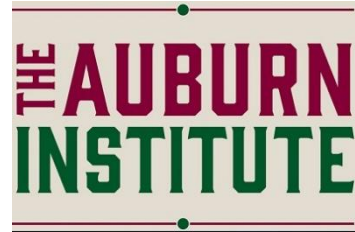

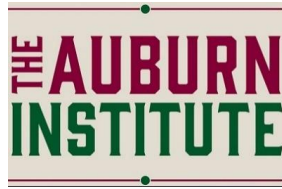

The following is more information about the Concert program from SAPOL:

The concert celebrates music that has shaped our shared cultural memory — told through cinema, theatre, and some of the great musical storytellers of our time. Across two tightly curated acts, the programme journeys from the wit and sparkle of *Candide* to the sweeping landscapes of *Lawrence of Arabia*, the glamour of James Bond, and the heartfelt optimism of *Chariots of Fire*.

Along the way, there are band features, vocal highlights, and solo moments that really show the versatility and colour of the ensemble — drawing on Broadway classics, Hollywood favourites, and timeless songs that speak directly to the heart.

The SAPOL Band is internationally recognised for their musical performance standard. Some of their achievements include:

The Parade Band is recognised internationally, and achievements to date include the **1990** and **2000 Edinburgh Military Tattoo**, and the **1998 Royal Tournament in London**. That tour also saw a traffic-stopping, solo march along 'The Strand' in the heart of London. In **2008**, the Band attended the **Musikschau der Nationen (Music Show of the Nations) in Bremen, Germany**.

Local Recycling – Simple Steps for Regional Communities

- Recycling in regional towns can be difficult due to **transport costs and distance to processing centres**.
- Despite this, many **simple local solutions already exist**.

Start with what we already have:

- Use **Council recycling bins** and the **Clare Waste Transfer Station** for approved items.
- Encourage households to **separate waste carefully** so recyclables are not contaminated.
- **Household batteries** can be recycled at collection points such as **local supermarkets like Beckers IGA**.
- **Clothing and shoes** can be placed in charity recycling bins such as the **Red Nose clothing bins**.
- **Coffee pods** and other specialist items are sometimes collected through **national recycling schemes run by businesses**.

Health and safety recycling:

- **Sharps disposal** is available through pharmacies or the **large yellow sharps container at Clare Hospital**.

Growing local recycling:

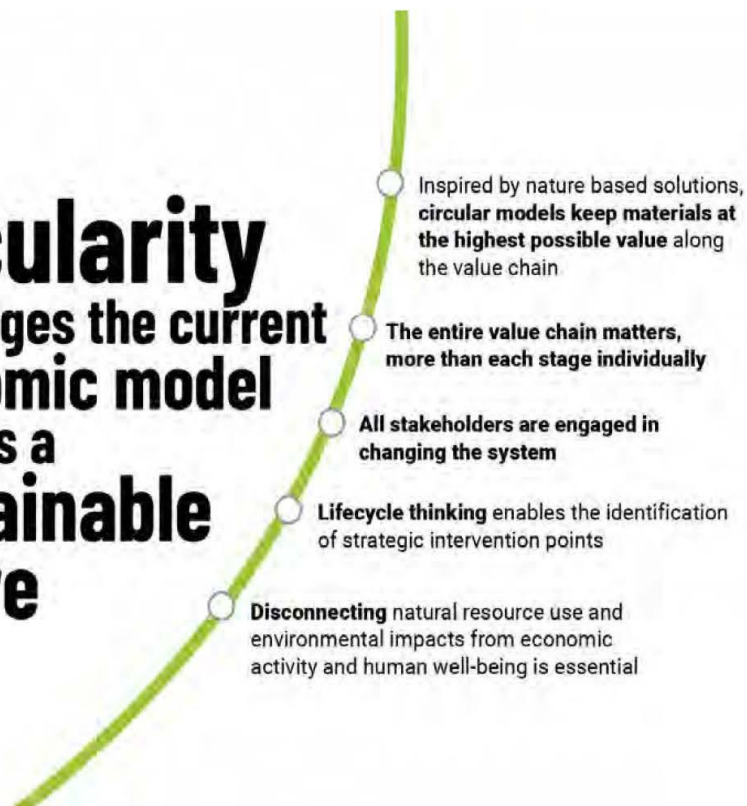
- Start small with a **local flyer listing recycling options** for new residents.

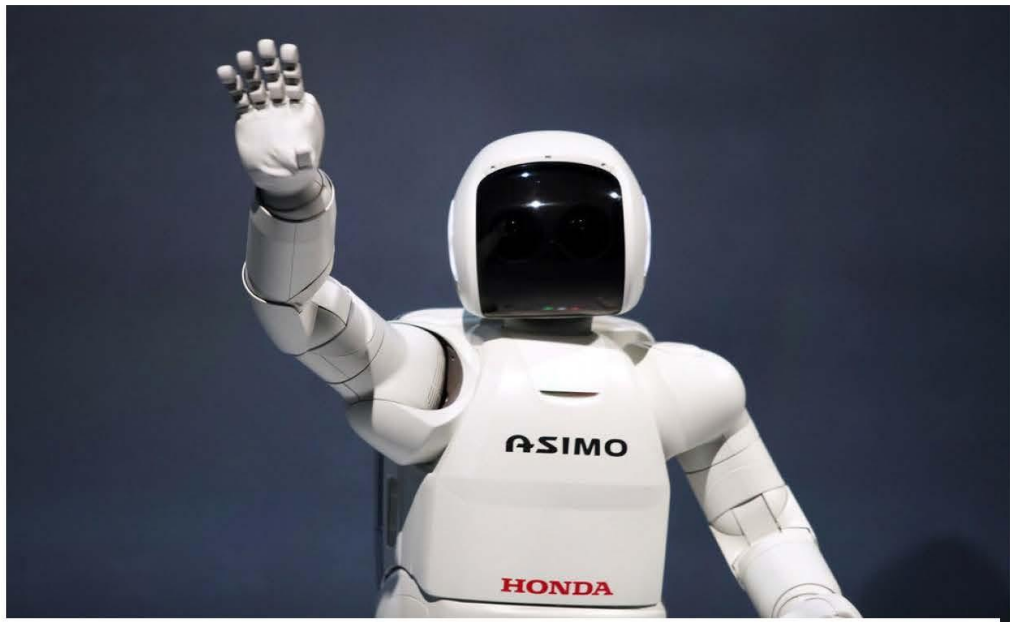
- Work with **local council and nearby towns** to combine recycling efforts.

Circularity challenges the current economic model towards a sustainable future



Firefighting Robots:



Across regional Australia, firefighting has always rested on steady local hands—volunteers who know the land, the wind, and their neighbours. But as fire seasons grow longer and conditions more unpredictable, the idea of robotic support is moving from possibility to planning.

Already, overseas examples show what is coming. Robots have entered burning buildings to map conditions before crews go in, carried heavy hoses in large industrial fires, and used thermal imaging to locate hotspots through thick smoke. These early machines are practical, rugged, and built for one purpose—keep people out of harm’s way where possible.

Looking ten years ahead, we can expect a noticeable shift. Firefighting robots are likely to become more sophisticated, more mobile, and more connected through artificial intelligence. Instead of simply relaying video, future systems may interpret what they see—identifying structural risks, tracking fire spread, and suggesting safer entry points. Humanoid-style robots, while still developing, could be capable of opening doors, climbing stairs, or navigating debris-filled homes, performing tasks currently too dangerous for volunteers.

The role of AI will be central. With fewer volunteers available across some regions, AI-linked systems may assist brigades by analysing fire behaviour in real time, guiding robotic units, and supporting incident controllers with clearer,

faster information. In this sense, robots won't replace volunteers—they will extend their reach.

Climate change is likely to hasten this shift. Hotter, drier conditions and more frequent extreme fire events place additional strain on already stretched brigades. As risk increases, so too does the need for safer ways to respond. Investing in robotic support may become not just beneficial, but necessary—particularly for large-scale or high-risk incidents.

Pros of Firefighting Robots

- Enter dangerous structures first, reducing risk to crews
- Provide real-time video, thermal imaging, and hazard detection
- Assist with heavy equipment and prolonged incidents
- AI integration can improve decision-making and safety
- Useful in extreme or unpredictable fire conditions

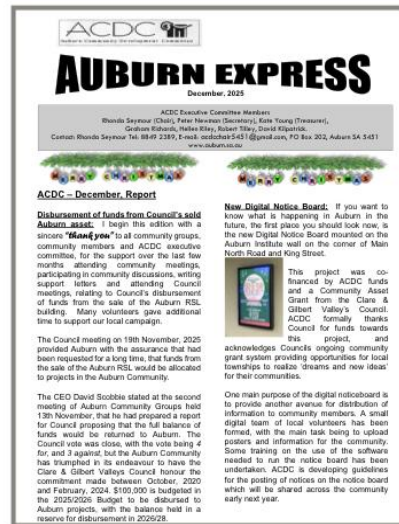
Cons of Firefighting Robots

- High upfront and ongoing costs
- May struggle in complex, cluttered, or collapsing environments
- Dependence on power, connectivity, and maintenance
- Require training and skilled operators
- Cannot replace human judgement, experience, and teamwork

In the years ahead, South Australian brigades may see shared robotic units supporting multiple towns, particularly during peak fire periods. Training exercises could include robotic deployment as standard practice. While the spirit of volunteering remains the backbone of firefighting, these tools may quietly take on the most dangerous tasks—giving our crews a better chance to step back, reassess, and return home safely.
