ACDC – August, Report

The ACDC Open Meeting saw a small gathering of community members at the Auburn Institute last Monday evening.

U2KIDS: Walter from **U2KIDS** subcommittee, gave a comprehensive report of the **U2KIDS** recent activities - mentioning the *Bike Track* project and the related development application with Council, a Town Map for kids' activities under development, collaboration with the Auburn Primary School for a Disco, selling of pinecones through the CWA shop, movie nights and activities in Centenary Park, 10cent bottles/cans collection at Auburn Caravan Park as a fundraiser. People were thanked for their assistance in taking the cans.

Auburn Institute Report: A busy few weeks ahead for volunteers in this space, with the SALA Festival exhibition starting this week, a Flea Market at the end of August, Melbourne Cup luncheon and requests for information on possible bookings into next year. The Auburn Institute's corner shop *Gladrags & More by Gert* is open Friday to Sunday each week.

Council Chambers: Council Chambers on St. Vincent Street, the *working group* continue to plan for events and activities at the Chambers building, ranging from meetings and markets to history walks. The recent successful grants have provided funds for purchase of tables and chairs for the facility. The toilet and septic project are in the development application process. The stone restoration project is waiting on the results of a grant application

with Heritage SA. We hope to hear by the end of August.

Auburn Tennis Club: The Tennis Club is awaiting news on funding for the replacement of the court fencing; a working bee will be held to prepare the court surface for the new tennis season. Auburn representatives were excited to win the Masterman Cup this year. The new tennis season will commence in October. **New members are always welcome.**

Upper Wakefield Landcare Group: The local Landcare volunteers had a great day working with the Auburn Primary School planting trees adjacent to the Church Street footbridge. Other community groups were also involved – Council, First Nations, Toyota, with a variety of activities taking place - art, food, nature, plants, and creatures. A great day had by all.

Auburn National Trust: The Trust's next meeting is at the Auburn Institute at 7.30pm on Monday 24th August. **New members welcome.**

Auburn Bowling Club: Members are practicing on neighbouring Greens at present, as the local Green undergoes preparations for next season of bowling. The Club has submitted a grant application for substantial funds to install solar panels and related infrastructure.

A Men's Shed for Auburn: A meeting is planned for Thursday 10th September 10.30

am at Velvet and Willow to discuss the possibility of establishing an Auburn Men's Shed. Come along and join in the conversation for what might be possible in our community.

Auburn Streetscape: The 'Clare & Gilbert Valleys Council Business Plan and Budget' includes an allocation of \$40,000 to Auburn Streetscape.

ACDC held some discussions with community members present at the open meeting, to gauge support for providing Council with suggestions for the expenditure of that budget allocation.

A list of features from the Streetscape Plan was presented for attendees to discuss, and suggest support for, or not. Several suggestions were made of how ACDC could seek further input from the broader community, and how best to provide information and possible recommendations to Council.

Those present agreed there is an opportunity for our community to make recommendations to Council on this budget matter. ACDC will be planning for the way forward on this topic and will be in touch with community and Council, in the near future.

Next ACDC meeting will be Monday 14th September, 7pm Auburn Institute. Community members are welcome to attend as observers.

Auburn's History Column:

Skillogalee murder continued...

In 1850 a brutal murder occurred in the vicinity of Skillogalee Creek, the area where the Auburn-Balaklava Road crosses the creek to go onto the plains. At a high point off this road was situated John HOILE'S Public House, called the "Port Henry Arms".

Characters mentioned in the court case are the owners of Hoile's Public House, Mr and Mrs HOILE, staff member HAWKSWORTH the barman, the butcher nearby Mr. William TITCUME (about 50 yards from the "Port Henry Arms"), Sergeant TICKMAN, employees of Mr SLATER J.P. who lived at the Head Station, seven miles away "Kercoonda" now called Undalya, Shepherd JOHN MANSFORTH (commonly called Sergeant), JAMES YATES – hut keeper (Mansforth and Yates shared a hut) (Yates had a parchment, signed by Sir William Dennison (Governor of

Van Dieman's Land and dated 5th October 1849, giving conditional pardon to James YATES who was sentenced at Lancaster in the year 1837 to fourteen years' transportation, and arrived per. ship "Neptune") Surgeon Charles Houtten WEBB of Clare who described the horrific injury that killed MANSFORTH, Thomas ADAMS, labourer living at Skillogalee Creek (about 400 yards from the "Port Henry Arms" in the head-station direction) and lawfully married to native woman Mary Ann ADAMS who was neatly dressed in the costume of white women her class, her hair hanging about her head in rich profusion. (On the night of Mansforth's murder two native women had taken his sheep back to the fold).



Mr Slater's Valley of the Wakefield, 1854, watercolour by William Leigh, call number PXA 1989 Mitchell Library, State Library of NSW (William Leigh 1829-1905) This land was a grant to G.R. Lambert in 1842. When Don Lambert's father lived here the rooms at the back of the Head Station building were called the boys' rooms, there being eleven children in the family.

William SLATER J.P., sheep farmer, resided on the Wakefield, employed John MANSFORTH, who used a hut that was about 5 miles from the head station and two miles from the "Port Henry Arms". MANSFORTH had been offered some brush work but declined as wanted to be a bullock driver.

Mary Ann ADAMS said she found the dead man in the bush while she was out with the sheep and saw the prisoner (YATES) in Mr. TITCUME'S house. The prisoner had stayed at her house the night before, his thumb was covered with blood and he had a bundle with him.

He didn't sleep as she heard him walking about the greater portion of the night and as soon as it was day light he went in the direction of Hoile's public house.

Constable GORE said he was on duty in the station house when the prisoner was brought in by inspector ALFORD and Sergeant SOPER.

someone rebuilding their life after experiencing domestic violence.

The residents of Auburn, the "Southern Gateway" to the Clare Valley, are caught in a tightening vice between environmental awareness and immediate survival. While local engagement in sustainability remains high—seen in events like the Clare Sustainability Festival and the active Clare Repair Cafe—the weight of daily "pressures" is reaching a breaking point.

The most visceral threat is the looming expansion of data centres. A recent [UN report](#) warns that AI-driven data centres could consume more water than every person on Earth by 2030. In a region where water is the lifeblood of world-class viticulture, the prospect of millions of gallons being diverted for cooling is a terrifying environmental reality.

However, for many Auburn locals, the global "water war" feels secondary to the immediate danger on their doorstep. The cost-of-living crisis is hitting regional SA hard, with rising fuel costs making the commute along the Horrocks Highway increasingly expensive. This is compounded by the appalling state of local roads; many are riddled with large potholes that cause thousands of dollars in vehicle damage, a cost family simply cannot absorb.





When your car is broken and your grocery bill is doubling, "saving the environment" can feel like a luxury. The environment is the ultimate foundation of the Clare Valley, but without addressing the potholes and the price of milk, the community's capacity to protect it is being eroded.

Yet there is hope. World politics may feel out of control, but Auburn has weathered droughts, fires, and economic downturns before. The same spirit that built the Repair Cafe and sustains the Sustainability Festival still runs deep. If the community rallies together, demanding better roads and responsible water stewardship, survival is not just possible—it is assured. Auburn will endure, and it will thrive.

****Firey Women: Empowering Rural Women for Bushfire Safety****

In the wake of the devastating 2005 Wangary fires on South Australia's Eyre Peninsula, a tragic pattern emerged: women and children were over-represented in the fatalities. Many women found themselves alone at home, caring for children, elderly parents, animals, and property, while the men with firefighting skills were away working. They simply lacked the skills and confidence to protect themselves.

From this hard lesson, the South Australian Country Fire Service (CFS) created [Firey Women](#) - an award-winning program designed specifically for women in rural and regional communities. It provides a safe, non-threatening environment where women can learn critical bushfire safety skills without fear of impatience or criticism.

What You Will Learn

The workshops cover both theory and hands-on practice over two days or four evenings. Key topics include:

- Preparing yourself emotionally and mentally for a bushfire
- Understanding the new bushfire danger ratings and warnings
- Deciding when to "leave early" or "stay and defend" your home
- Writing and practicing a Bushfire Survival Plan
- Identifying hazards around your home and property
- Operating pumps and firefighting equipment
- Understanding bushfire behaviour so you can make smart decisions
- Map reading and practical navigation skills

Why It Works

The program was designed by rural women, for rural women. Pre and post-workshop evaluations show remarkable results. Before attending, only 7% of women had a written, practiced Bushfire Survival Plan. After the course, that figure jumped to 69%. Similarly, only 11% had a property protection plan with a calendar of actions; after Firey Women, 66% did.

Beyond the statistics, women report returning home with greater confidence, empowerment, and determination to act safely during fire season. Some even go on to become CFS volunteers or start Community Fire Safe groups in their areas.

How to Get Involved

Workshops are adapted to your local fire environment and run at times that suit women, with childcare and travel needs considered. Visit the [CFS Firey Women page](#) or call the CFS Information Hotline on 1800 362 361 to find a workshop near you.

Being prepared is not about being scared - it is about being ready. And every rural woman deserves the skills to keep her family safe.

2026 Clare Valley flocking of the woollen sheep

The 2026 Clare Valley Festival of the Lamb in partnership with the SACWA Warnes Group and the Plains Producer is staging a Clare Valley knitted flock of woollen lambs and window display.

The Clare Valley Festival of the Lamb is a multi-day festival which began in 2020 with a focus on attracting people to the Valley to celebrate the sheep industry. It is the regions spring equinox festival which combines with the first buds of the vines and the premier time for new-season lambs.

The SACWA Warnes Group are collaborating with the festival and the Plains Producer for the Flocking of the Sheep Exhibition. This is designed for people to create a sheep using wool and then send it to the festival so they can then be displayed throughout the Clare Valley at selected venues. At the end of the festival the sheep will then be rounded up and made available for the SACWA Baby Parcels and Emergency Aid.

People are invited to visit the Clare Valley Festival of the Lamb website <https://cvfol.au/> to view some patterns. The sheep can be knitted / crocheted but they must use sheep's wool and people then send them to the festival and they are asked to include a name for their sheep.

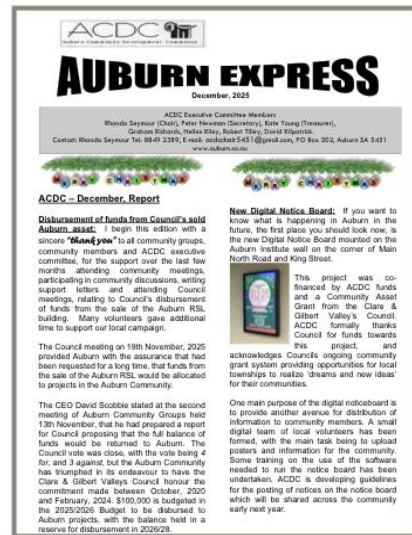

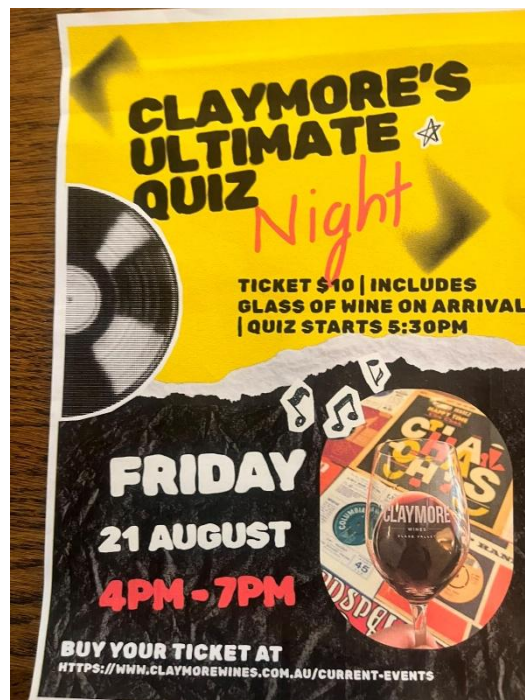
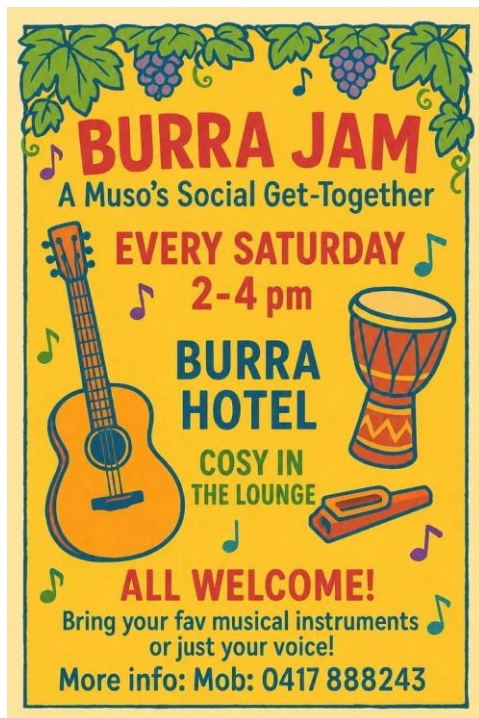
